The elementary class has an attendance of 2-4 students with 2 adult teachers. We continue to use the Dig In lessons Bible In One Year by Group. We completed the lessons in May of Bible In One Year. The new series Life of Jesus was ordered, cost \$128.00 quarterly.

Report on Annual Conference, 2023

From the bottom of my heart, I thank you for allowing me to attend and participate in this year's annual conference. Attending is SO MUCH better than watching recordings on-line later in the summer! I learned MUCH about my role as Lay Member to Annual Conference — and I still have much to learn! Although I was recovering from major surgery, I was able to attend a Laity Session lead by Rev. Jack Shitama. He shared ideas on how leaders can be a "non-anxious presence" in our currently chronically anxious society. I also participated in praise and worship services. The music was GREAT and a LOT of fun! Talk about a spirit filled room! WOW!! (There's a new-to-praise-band song to come from this eventually!)

Throughout the conference, I enjoyed the opportunity to meet new people from other congregations and various ministries. Our conversations during "Circles of Love" and at meals enriched my experience and my learning. It was a joy also to reconnect with others who historically are part of our St. Paul family. I praise God for this experience!

#### LOVE

Love is not an emotion – it is an ACTION. It is not to be PROFESSED, but to be GIVEN, or BESTOWED.

The love that Jesus embodies is GRACE, not sacrifice. Those who proclaim to be in a relationship with Jesus MUST be ALL ABOUT LOVE! The theme of this year's conference is All About LOVE!

# A Summary of the message from Bishop Easterling

#### The New Commandment

When he had gone out, Jesus said, "Now the Son of Man has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, "Where I am going, you cannot come." I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." John 13: 31-35

Bell Hook defines love as the will to extend oneself for the purpose of nurturing ones own or another's spiritual growth. Bishop Easterling goes on to explain that if we are not growing spiritually then we are not loving accurately. If PETER gets it wrong, how often might we? Our short coming: WE keep trying to define SIN or abuse, rather than letting God define sin. The ONLY way we can prove we are in a relationship with Jesus is to LOVE like Jesus loved us!

Bishop Easterling "called out" the conference for not loving through the discernment process. After the resurrection, Jesus asked Peter "Peter, do you love me?" With a heavy heart, Bishop Easterling explained that "how we part from one another tomorrow when we do what we're going to do, matters!" So, What's Love Got to Do With it? (Sing along!) EVERYTHING!!

Along with Bishop Easterlings message, the evening also included fun and lively Gospel and Christian Contemporary music selections performed by two different groups of musicians. The bishop also reflected on the trials and losses of Natives of this land. BEAUTIFUL song lyrics inviting God to be with us, for us to see God all around – in the seas, the stars of night, the mountains and plains were sung.

#### **Preparing for Work**

Thursday morning began with **Bible Study lead by Bishop Peter Weaver**, retired. Referencing Acts chapter 2, he shares with the conference that we are to be a "Perpetually Pentecostal

People" – that is we are to always be filled with the spirit! In his message, Weaver warned that churches should be careful to not quench the spirit with busy-ness – the building, budgets, and by-laws that we often let get in the way of being spirit-filled!

To better prepare conference participants for engaging in the business of conference in the spirit of love, we participated in small groups called "Circles of Love." Our task was to explore and understand 3 levels of conversation.

- 1. Transactional conversation: sharing what we know, an exchange of ideas.
- 2. Positional conversation: defending, and "selling" our own ideas.
- 3. Transformational conversation: focusing on sharing, discovering, and asking questions.

In our smaller circles, we spent time getting to know one another. Then moved on to some Transformational conversation. We discovered how God's love guided the members at our table to love others. We shared the gifts and challenges we have encountered in loving others. These conversations, different at every table, were personal and meaningful. These set the tone for each person as we moved to the afternoon of conference work.

#### **Resolution Conference Work**

These resolutions were addressed over several sessions on Thursday and Friday. Voting results included.

<u>Disaffiliation</u>: A total of 23 churches throughout the BWC completed the Disaffiliation process and voted to disaffiliate with the UMC. By majority vote, the conference agreed to allow the 23 churches to disaffiliate from the UMC.

<u>Church Closures</u>: Four churches of the BWC will close this year.

<u>Establishment of a BWC Clergy Bereavement Protocol and Policy</u>: There is currently no protocol for bereavement leave for clergy in BWC. This resolution proposed the establishment of paid leave and coverage for clergy in the event of death of a spouse, child (including born, still born, adopted, fostered), or parent of clergy. The conference passed this resolution.

<u>Building Missions and Stewardship of UMC Property</u>: When churches are closed, they are rarely sold at (nor above) the value they really hold. This resolution supports increasing the different ways that the UMC could retain and re-purpose the property to include providing affordable housing. The conference voted to pass this resolution.

<u>Identifying and Opposing Apartheid in the Holy Land</u>: This resolution requested that the BWC take and voice an official stance against the violence and oppression currently taking place in "Occupied Palestinian Territories" under the current Israeli Government. The conference voted to pass this resolution.

<u>Maternity and Paternity Leave for Foster/Resource Parents</u>: While such leave currently exists for children born or adopted into clergy families, children coming into families via foster care and emergency placements are not included. This resolution provides paid leave for clergy in these situations. The conference voted to pass this resolution.

Affirmation of the Queer Delegates' Call to Center Justice and Empowerment for LGBTQIA+
People in the UMC: This resolution of affirmation provides that LGBTQIA+ people in the BWC
will be protected, affirmed and empowered within and beyond our local churches, and that
punitive steps will not be taken or used in resolving complaints against clergy regarding their
sexual orientation or the officiating of weddings of LGBTQIA+ persons. The conference voted to
pass this resolution.

<u>Vital Connections Within Our Annual Conference</u>: This resolution suggests that district superintendents aspire to attend each local church charge conference for the purpose of improving the accuracy of information being shared between BWC and local churches. Discussion of the demands this would place on DSs resulted in this resolution NOT passing.

Integrity in Conference, District, and Local Church Leadership: In response to "fall out" from the disaffiliation process, this resolution requested that the Bishop and Cabinet of the BWC determine the intentions (to disaffiliate of not) of leadership and clergy within the BWC, and that clergy make the same determinations of the leadership at their churches. Significant discussion followed. A motion was made to "indefinitely postpone" this resolution. The MOTION passed.

In Support of Creating a US Regional Conference: At the General Conference level, it is proposed that the United States will have equal representation as the other Central Conferences. This will allow the US to make or change policies reflective of US Culture. The BWC raised their voice in support of this measure. The conference voted to pass this resolution.

<u>Supporting the Removal of Discriminatory Policies</u>: This resolution supports removing discriminatory policies and harmful language related to sexual orientation from BWC policies. Further, it encourages delegates to support such changes at the next General Conference. The conference voted to pass this resolution.

<u>Clarity when Churches Disaffiliate form UMC within the BWC, and at some point wish to RETURN to the BWC</u>: A motion to refer this process to the Trustees passed.

# **Reports from other Committees**

Recommendations from the Commission on Equitable Compensation: The Commission recommends the base salary be increased 4% and the Housing Allowance be increased 3%.

Recommendations from the Board of Pensions and Health Benefits: This Board presented their plan for continuing to meet the needs of clergy, both currently working and retired (and surviving spouses), through their pensions and health benefits. This year, there will be a change from United Health Care to Blue Cross/Blue Shield. Increases to both the employer and employee contributions of health insurance premiums are expected this year.

<u>Conference Budget Report</u>: The Council of Finance and Administration proposed an annual budget exceeding \$18 million. The conference voted to approve the proposed budget.

<u>Board Of Ordained Ministries</u>: A total of 9 members were Commissioned and 7 were Ordained. Along with David Showalter and Victor Harner, 29 addition persons celebrate their retirement this year.

<u>Discipleship Council Report</u>: This council continues to take steps to inspire and equip local faith communities to develop disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. They challenge and support the conference and local churches in the processes of Deepening Discipleship, Seeing ALL People, Living and Loving Like Jesus, and Multiplying Impact.

Once again on Friday morning, Bishop Peter Weaver, retired, lead another Bible study. Again, referencing Acts, Weaver prompts us to ACT – to GO! He tells us a faith journey is never complete when it's just "me and Jesus" – that it MUST include loving others!

In this spirit, participants gathered for a Love in Action Mission project. To meet the expressed need of under-resourced schools in the community, conference participants worked to clean up and beautify spaces. Bags for local students included books and additional needed supplies.

The remainder of Friday was used to complete the work of the resolutions and reports shared above.
