What does it mean to be "worn out"? I looked up the original Greek, and the Greek word for "worn out" is the verb diaphtheiró (διαφθείρω), which is a combination of the verbs diá, which means "thoroughly," and phtheírō, which means "corrupt." The outward man eventually becomes thoroughly corrupt, a truth we all know empirically.

Now, what does it also mean to be "made new"? The Greek word for this is anakainoó (ἀνακαινώνω), where aná means "up," pointing upwards, and kainoō means "to renew. It's a step up to "that higher place," so to speak, and to do that, you can't try to hold on to the outer things that will decay. Instead, we need to keep laying them down, one by one, so that our inner man can take another step toward the kingdom of God.

Therefore, even the symptoms of growing old can become a condition of gratitude, depending on how we look at them, because they prove that the day we will see the Lord again is getting closer. It all comes down to where our perspectives are. If we set our eyes on this world and the past, we will be discouraged, but if it is the other way around, we will always live in praise of God and heaven.

What are your resolutions and expectations for the new year? May 2025 be a year that brings us closer to God, filling our lives with God's joy and hope so that we can endure and overcome everything.

The St. Paul UMC Trustees meet on the first **Saturday** of each month for their business meeting and work time around the church campus. Items discussed include church projects, church maintenance and finances. Work sessions are scheduled as needed to maintain the facilities and complete projects.



Completed projects in the months of October and November include:

1. Repaired clogged drain in main bathrooms in CLC
2. Installed condensation pumps on two mini-splits in SPUMPS classroom
3. Installed room divider from "The Zone" to rooms 11 and 12
4. Installed new speakers in the sanctuary
5. Repainted parking lot lines and handicap spaces
6. Scrubbed, washed and waxed the CLC hallway floors
7. Scrubbed the CLC gym floor
8. Installed additional "Ring" cameras throughout campus
9. Repaired the sanctuary furnace with new mother board and oil filter
10. Repaired CLC sinks in main bathrooms
11. Conducted ozone cleaning in SPUMPS wing

Upcoming projects include:

1. On hold: SPUMC Home Mission Project - The Trustees are planning to rehab the current Fellowship Hall adjacent to the sanctuary. James Ritter is spearheading the project. Dates to follow to lend a hand with cleaning out the closets, drywall, insulation, flooring, ceiling tiles, etc... This is a facelift that is LONG overdue!
2. Paint the church office
3. Complete action items from 2024 parsonage inspection
4. Continue floor stripping, scrubbing and waxing classrooms in CLC.
5. Rekey locks for doors into the CLC
6. Schedule and inspect the fire suppressant system in kitchen asap

The trustees maintain a detailed list of projects across our campus and are working to complete them. Please inform a trustee if you see any area that needs repair and/or if you have an idea for improvement. We want St. Paul UMC to be an inviting, safe space for all to worship and fellowship.

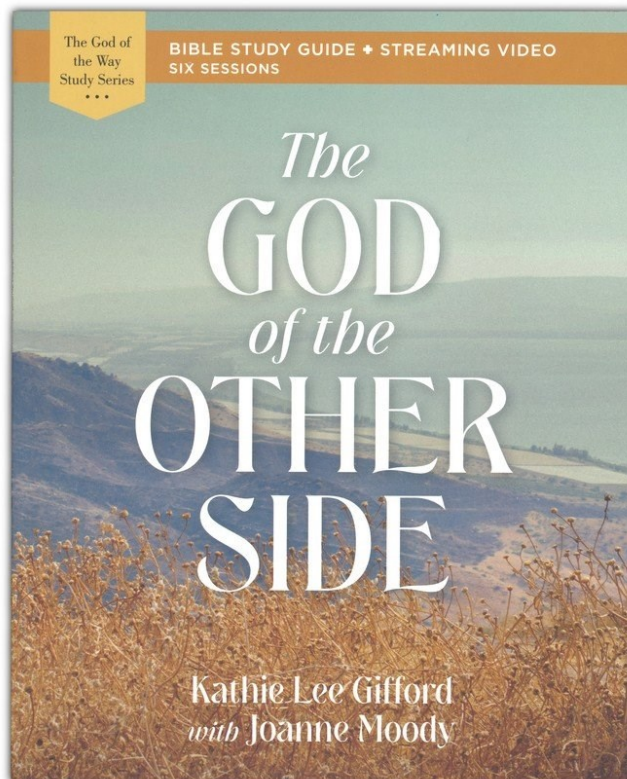
The GOD of the OTHER SIDE

In the Gospels, we often read of Jesus telling his disciples to travel to the "other side" of the Sea of Galilee. What we don't often realize is what this other side represented. It was the region of the Decapolis, where many pagan religions were practiced. The disciples, under Jewish law, would have been considered unclean even to step foot there.

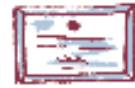
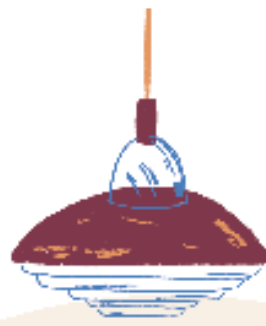
